## **Needs case**

## Why did we develop Charging Futures?

- Significant areas of electricity network charging no longer reflected how the network was used
- Changes could have a significant impact on all network users
- To deliver reform effectively would require a step change in amount and pace of change
- Needed to consider users at a distribution and transmission level together

# **Our requirements**

## **Through Charging Futures, we needed to:**

- Make the change process accessible to all network users
- Use simple and approachable language
- Use neutral branding



## Routes for network users to engage

We use a range of methods to create opportunities for network users to learn, ask and contribute about electricity network reform

- Forum
- Website
- Webinars

- Newsletters
- Task forces
- Newsletters

- Podcasts
- Summary notes







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# **Charging Futures Forum**

## Regular event open to all network users

- Held every 3-6 months
- Open to all network users up to ~100 attendees
- Focuses on sessions that require attendees to actively contribute to the topic and collaborate with others
- Avoids sessions that only informs attendees Pre-work is distributed ahead of the event to bring everyone up to a common level of understanding
- Makes use of panels and Q&As so that all users can get access to industry experts

# **Charging Futures Forum – Pre work**

## Enables all attendees to have a common level of understanding

#### Pre-forum questions and podcast

Ofgem will be running discussion sessions on the consultation. We recommend you **prepare for the forum** by reading/watching/listening to **at least one** of these resources:

- > The Access consultation document (if you want detail)
- > The Access consultation summary note (high level only)
- > The Access consultation webinar (if you have an hour)
- > The Access consultation podcast (if you have 30 mins)

Keeping these questions in mind:

- > What are your views on Ofgem's proposals?
- > How do you think this work should be taken forward?

To kick off the discussion, we talk around these questions in our latest podcast.

Section of a pre-forum email

- Makes a range of routes to access the key information that allow users to self select how much detail they want
- Poses prompt questions for attendees to consider ahead of the forum with time to consult colleagues, suppliers and customers
- A pre-forum podcast also discusses these questions and talks through the agenda



# **Supporting consultation periods**

## Consultations can be daunting

- Often lengthy and go into significant detail and complexity
- We have tried to make sure that network users have a range of options to choose from to access the level of detail that is right for them

# Summary of how we have used other routes

### **Webinars**

# Held when needed to inform users of key updates

- Open to all network users to sign up
- Held as and when key updates are required and focuses on informing
- Used to support consultations or decisions – gives a 1 hour alternative to a 90 page document
- Opportunity to ask questions of the experts

## **Summary notes**

# Published alongside significant documents

- Available to all network users on the website
- Published as and when key updates are required and focuses on informing
- Used to support consultations or decisions – gives an alternative to a lengthy document
- Enables parties without the time to read the full document to stay up to date with key messages and chose where to get involved in more detail

### **Podcasts**

# Informal updates in an easily accessible format

- 10-30 minute updates to industry
- Often used alongside other communications as a bite-size alternative to large documents or webinars

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
