CMP219 – CMP192 Post Implementation Clarifications

Background

- CMP192 introduced enduring user commitment arrangements for generators into the CUSC
- New arrangements went live from 1st April 2013
- However, implementation of CMP192 highlighted that the legal text requires refining
- Raise a 'tidy-up' modification prior to further development of CUSC Section 15 for offshore and nongeneration users

Proposed CUSC Modification

- Addresses following issues
 - Typographical errors
 - Numbering inconsistencies
 - Redundant text Transitional arrangements
 - Additional detail required to remove ambiguity
 - Unintended omissions non generation users
- Proposal raised in May 2013
- 2 Workgroup meetings held

Workgroup Discussions

- Materiality analysis
 - Liability for 'Actual' Users if commissioning delayed by User
 - Pre Trigger Date Liability for 'Fixed' Users
- Evidence provided for the original intent of CMP192 workgroup
- Additional changes suggested by the Workgroup members
- Legal text changes
- Other areas outside the remit of CMP219
 - Not in keeping with CMP219's intent of 'clarifications only'
 - Would require separate modification proposals

Workgroup Consultation

- 3 responses received
 - All generally supportive of CMP219
 - Suggested additional clarifications
 - 1 response highlighted the issues with security arrangements for DNO connected generation
- No Workgroup Consultation Alternative Requests received

Workgroup Vote

- 5 Workgroup members voted
- 1 Workgroup member wasn't able to attend
- All the members unanimously voted in support of CMP219
 - No WACMs were raised

Views against Applicable CUSC Objectives

"The efficient discharge by the licensee of the obligations imposed upon it under the Act"

Yes. It improves clarity and facilitates better industry understanding, thus it is efficient

"Facilitating effective competition in the generation and supply of electricity, and (so far as consistent therewith) facilitating such competition in the sale, distribution and purchase of electricity"

Yes. It clarifies the treatment of Users and removes the scope for discrimination

Workgroup Conclusions

- Workgroup has met its Terms of Reference
- Agreed legal text
- Implementation 10 working days after the Selfgovernance appeal window
