

The ENC Development and Implementation Process



Changes possible in Code Development Process

- RFG is now late in the Comitology process
- Text changes can be proposed by member states, but must be agreed by Commission and other member states
- DECC is GB's representative at the Cross Border Committee discussions / voting
- For DECC to gather GB stakeholders views:
 - Expect a future JESG workshop when new text is released
 - You can engage bilaterally

Changes possible in Code Development Process

However...

- DECC will need to consolidate GB Comments to form a negotiating position
- There is no guarantee of success. There are 28 member states – UK is just one, and this is a political process
- Issues which have multiple member state support, and quantified impacts more likely to be successful

Approvals phase

- After Cross Border Committee, it is not possible to change the text before it is published
- The EU Parliament must vote to approve the text, but they will vote to approve or reject (they do not change)
- Once published, it enters in to force as European Law
 - GB (and other countries) will need to comply with the law or risk infraction

ENC Amendments Procedure

- Once entered into force (law):
 - Member State must choose and may update their choice of national parameters, within the provisions of RFG.
 - To change the provisions of RFG, a new law will need to be passed by the Commission/Parliament


The process for proposing and making changes to the network codes is not yet fully developed

ENC Amendments Procedure

- Article 7 of Regulation 714/2009 allows interested parties to raise draft amendments to ACER, which will be consolidated and proposed to the Commission.
 - ACER may propose amendments of its own
 - ACER is required to consult stakeholders as part of the process (no details on mechanism)
 - The Commission can raise their own amendments

ENC Amendments Procedure

- ACER has specified two processes for how it will collate, consider and propose items to the Commission:
 - Periodic process (every 5 years), so first for RFG in ?2020
 - Ad hoc proposal exceptional cases for those with an urgent character.
- Outline process proposed by ACER has four steps:
 - Admissibility and initial assessment
 - Impact Analysis
 - Public Consultation
 - Final assessment and reasoned proposal to the Commission
